HINTS AND TIPS

 Make your own project kit. After you have purchased or gathered everything you need for a project, place it all along with the pattern in a zippered bag so that it will be ready to go when you have time to work on it.

- Use wine glass charms to identify your scissors and cutters when you take them to a class or retreat.
- Save large empty pill bottles to hold thread and bobbins for a take-along applique project. Poke a hole through the cap so you can pull out the thread you need without opening the lid.
- Use a CD case for storing templates.

THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY CHALLENGE FOR THE QUILT SHOW 2011

The executive has decided on the challenge for the 30th anniversary of the Guild and the deadline will be next April in time for the Quilt Show. Final deadline to be published early next year. But we wanted everyone to have lots of time to plan their quilt. Since it's our 30th we decided the number 30 had to play an important part of the challenge. So have fun with it and be creative. We will have prizes for the top 3. This would be a great way to use up a charm pack since they typically have 40 fabrics all coordinated for you if you don't think you can do it on your own!

Here are the rules:

- it can be a circle or as many sides as you like BUT each side must be the same size and be either 30cm OR 30". So if you do a square it must be 30cm x 30cm or 30in x 30in. Or you can do a triangle with all 3 sides being 30cm or 30in. If you chose a circle it is the circumference that must be 30cm or 30in and unless you're into really miniature quilts a 30cm circumference is really small.
- It must be quilted in some way
- It may be embellished any way you choose but it is not necessary
- The edges must be finished in some way but not necessarily bound.

- You must provide a write-up explaining how your quilt meets the criteria.
- You must have a label on the back with your name and the name of the quilt.
- You can include any description with the quilt i.e. explaining your inspiration or ideas in making it
- Then you must incorporate 2 of the following (binding and backing don't count):
- it must have exactly 30 different fabrics
- it must have exactly 30 pieces
- it must have exactly 30 colors in the same color family
- it must have exactly 30 blocks
- it must be made entirely of 1930's fabrics
- it must have 1 piece of fabric from 30 different people (include the list of people with your quilt)

Our next Quilt Bee will be held on Friday and Saturday, February 19 and 20, at Calvary Lutheran church, located at the corner of Edward and Donald Streets. Sign-up will be at tonight's meeting. Cotton Theory quilting is a new and different way to construct your quilt. It's backward!

Unlike traditional quilts, which are pieced together, layered with batting and then quilted, Cotton Theory projects are quilted first, one segment at a time, and then assembled using Betty Cotton's foldand-finish procedures.

Most quilters enjoy piecing together the top of a traditional quilt because they can see the design as it takes shape, and the results are rewarding. The actual quilting, however, can be a challenge, especially if your traditional quilt is large. Often, quilting becomes the least favorite part of constructing a quilt.

Reversible quilt.

The Cotton Theory method makes quilting easy, no matter the size of your quilt. You quilt each piece individually before you construct your project, so quilting becomes just as enjoyable as piecing together the design.

You can quilt pieces creatively and

During Cotton Theory assembly, you sew the raw edges of your quilted pieces together, leaving seam allowances that are folded on the outside of your quilt and then stitched in place using one or more Cotton Theory techniques. This adds an extra dimension to the surface. The result is a reversible quilt that combines sewing, quilting and embroidery, if you choose. You end up with two quilts - one on each side - by constructing one project. All work is done with a sewing machine; there's no need to do handwork. It's fast, fun, and completely unique.

Linda Schmidt - January 15, 2010

Have you ever noticed how closely the quilting movement resembles the French Resistance movement? Think about it. Most quilt guild meetings are at a church, at a time when people won't notice a large number of women coming singly or in small groups, walking nonchalantly up to an unmarked door, and slipping inside. They are laden down with bags, usually marked with strange runes and signs made of squares and triangles. There is rarely a sign saying "Quilt Guild meets here."


We are like a small revolutionary band, a secret society where other quilters automatically feel linked. We mix fabric, color and stolen time to make beauty, whether it is out of scraps, worn-out clothing or new fabric. This is not something a whole lot of people understand, so a quilt guild functions in many ways as a support group of the highest order. The members help in time of need, understand when things go awry, and sometimes hide out from the Quilt Police.

I think quilting is a Resistance in other ways: resistance against mass production, shoddy workmanship and an uncaring world. We take time, fabric and memories and wrap them all up to keep someone warm, whether they are family or strangers. We do it to remember them, to connect them to all the people who go before us and after us, including the people who will be touched by our work, even if they never know our names. Most of these quilts are given to shelters of all kinds, all with the hope of making the world a better place, all part of the quilters' Resistance Movement.

Like many people, I have never marched in a peace rally or taken a stand that meant commitment to a cause. I grew up a fairly easygoing, laid back person who figured things are just better left alone to work themselves out. But then I got to thinking - what if every person who could do something, did? I'm not good at a lot of things, but I can make quilts.


Lots of other quilters, members of the Resistance, are out there, too, doing what they can do. Guilds all over the world are making quilts for people who need to have something made by caring hands, something they can call their own, when all else has been taken from them, even their dignity. We are making quilts that go directly to those who have the need or raffling quilts to make money for research. We're doing our best to put the message out that there are still caring people in the world; people who know the importance of people helping other people.

So, be an active member of the Resistance and do what you can do, whatever that may be. Make a quilt by yourself or join a group that makes quilts. Get to know your fellow Resistance members, whether they meet in person or online. Be part of the Quilters' Resistance against an uncaring world, and know that you are not alone.



Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild 2009-2010 Block of the Month

BOM #6



Corners (BG) 2 ½" x 2 ½" – need 4 Half Square Rectangles:

(BG) 2 ½" x 2 ½" – need 4 (color 2) 2 ½" x 4 ½" – need 2 (color 3) 2 ½" x 4 ½" – need 2

Half Square Triangles:

(color 1) 3 ¼" x 3 ¼" – need 2 (BG) 3 ¼" x 3 ¼" – need 2


1. Make the 4 half square triangles using the 3 ¼" BG and color 1. Square up to 2 ½"

2. Sew a 2 ½" BG corner square to one edge so it looks like this picture. Make 4. Press to the corner square



Making the half square rectangles:

- 3. Lightly draw a diagonal line on the back of the 4 remaining 2 ½" BG squares.
- 4. Place it right sides together on one end of the 2 ½" x 4 ½" rectangle. So it looks like the picture.
- 5. Sew on the line. Press to rectangle. Then trim excess. Make 2 of each color.



- 7. Sew the 4 blocks together to look like the block picture. Pressing seams so they will interlock.
- 8. It should measure 8 1/2" square
