HINTS AND TIPS

- Set in Quarter Triangles:
 At a retreat this past week, a quilter needed to know how to determine the size of the set in triangles.
 This tip was found to answer that question.
 - Measure the length of the longest side of the triangle and add 1 14".
- If you have chosen a colour and cannot seem to find a complement for it, try to see its afterimage. Stare at the fabric for about 60 sec. Then close your eyes to see what colour appears in your eyes. Usually you see a pastel form of the perfect complement colour.
- Pull pins out of the seam line just before the needle reaches them. This not only prevents damage to your needle but also decreases distortion in the fabrics as you stitch.

Starting with the October meeting, three books will be chosen and reviewed: this month's books are as follows:

The Farmer's Wife Sampler Quilt – Laurie Aaron Hird

In 1922, the very popular *The Farmer's Wife* magazine held a contest asking a simple question: "Would you want your daughter to marry a farmer?" Author Laurie Hird has excerpted 55 of the top letters, and using these letters as inspiration, she selected 111 traditional 6-inch quilt blocks and created a tribute quilt to the contest. Each block is fully illustrated and comes with complete cutting templates on the bonus CD*. In addition, she provides complete quilt making instructions for the queen-sized sampler quilt with all 111 blocks, as well as additional instruction on converting the quilt to lap, twin, double and king sizes. *Techniques: piecing and reference*

1 project, 111 blocks – 256 color pgs. Item No. 45058

I love historical books because they are so inspiring! It is interesting to know how women lived in the past, expressed their beliefs, and managed to survive without all the luxuries of current times. In 1922, there was a contest in a widely famous magazine called The Farmer's Wife, and they petitioned readers to submit their opinions on whether they wanted their daughters to marry a farmer. In the end, the reader submissions surprised the editors of the magazine!

There are 111 blocks inspired by the letters these women wrote to The Farmer's Wife magazine with excerpts from the letters along with each beautiful block. The blocks wind up in a very beautiful pieced quilt that you can build too! You also get a CD with a

larger version of quilt assembly diagrams. You will most certainly enjoy the story along with the delightfully honored blocks to dip your thread into.

Sew Necessary – Nancy Halvorsen

Now you can make everything necessary and fun for organizing your sewing space. You'll find designs that are perfect for everyday use as well as projects that will add a special festive touch throughout the holiday season. Projects include pincushions, needle wallets, scissor chatelaines, a sewing basket, scissor fobs, project tote bags and more!

Techniques: general sewing, appliqué, and embroidery 16 projects – 36 pgs – 8 color. Item No. 45092

This book is for all of the Art to Heart lovers out there! Every book Nancy Halvorsen graces us with is a winner, but this one is "sew" special. Yep, you guessed it, the theme is sewing! This book will give you great ideas for gifting your sewing buddies or guild members. There are even holiday themed projects! You MUST take a peek at the inside pages to see what's waiting for you! This book is a Quilt Along waiting to happen!

Top This! - Nona Davis

Quilters are busy people whose favorite projects are versatile, quick and practical. *Top This!* provides the inspiration for a year's worth of quilts and table toppers - perfect for all seasons and occasions. It's a pleasing and useful pattern book that you will use to revisit favorite fabric from your stash, or take a trip to your local quilt shop to increase your stash so you can sit down at your sewing machine and just get started on a new topper.

Techniques: piecing and appliqué 24 projects – 88 color pgs. Item No. 45062

Top This is the perfect book to go to when you have the urge to make a quilted project, but may not want to do a big quilt!

This book is divided into projects by month, with 2 options for each month, one larger project, and another that is smaller and can be completed in less time. All can be completed in a weekend, and what fun to have the option of two projects using the same blocks just put together in different ways. Top This would be a great Christmas gift for the time strapped quilter.

QUILT SHOW

Just a reminder to everyone that I'm still looking for lots of volunteers for the Quilt Show, especially for the Vendor & Advertising committees. The sign up sheets will be at the Sept. meeting or you can email me (I don't think I'll be at the Sept. meeting). Also, don't forget about the "30" challenge for our 30th anniversary. For those of you who are new or who have forgotten, I have reprinted the rules here:

THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY CHALLENGE FOR THE QUILT SHOW 2011

The executive has decided on the challenge for the 30th anniversary of the Guild and the deadline will be next April in time for the Quilt Show. Final deadline to be published early next year. But we wanted everyone to have lots of time to plan their quilt. Since it's our 30th we decided the number 30 had to play an important part of the challenge. So have fun with it and be creative. We will have prizes for the top 3. This would be a great way to use up a charm pack since they typically have 40 fabrics all coordinated for you if you don't think you can do it on your own!

Here are the rules:

- it can be a circle or as many sides as you like BUT each side must be the same size and be either 30 cm OR 30". So if you do a square it must be 30 cm x 30 cm or 30 in x 30 in. Or you can do a triangle with all 3 sides being 30 cm or 30 in. If you chose a circle it is the circumference that must be 30 cm or 30 in and unless you're into really miniature quilts a 30 cm circumference is really small.
- It must be quilted in some way
- It may be embellished any way you choose but it is not necessary

- The edges must be finished in some way but not necessarily bound.
- You must provide a write-up explaining how your quilt meets the criteria.
- You must have a label on the back with your name and the name of the quilt.
- You can include any description with the quilt i.e. explaining your inspiration or ideas in making it
- Then you must incorporate 2 of the following (binding and backing don't count):
- it must have exactly 30 different fabrics
- it must have exactly 30 pieces
- it must have exactly 30 colors in the same color family
- it must have exactly 30 blocks
- it must be made entirely of 1930's fabrics
- it must have 1 piece of fabric from 30 different people (include the list of people with your quilt)

COMFORT QUILTS

Comfort quilts are collected year-round and distributed through various community organizations. Kits are often available at meetings, and the comfort quilts are the focus of the annual quilt bee(s). Use 100% cotton fabric with a simple pattern and light quilting to make a quilt in bright or restful colours.

Recommended sizes:

Hospice Beds	63" x 80"
Neo Natal	36" x 36"
Crib/Bassinet	34" x 48"
Wheel Chair	36" x 48"
Recliner chair/Nap Quilt	40" x 55"
