Well it's only 6 weeks until show time. Time to finish off all those quilts and get the Intent to Show form in - remember it is due by April 1st which is before the next meeting. The hanging committee needs a few weeks to do the layout. For those new to the Guild the Intent To Show form is where you list the quilts you plan to put in to the show. Please be accurate in your measurements. Don't be afraid to submit a quilt if you are a beginner. Put a note on it saying it's your first quilt. People will love them. We hope to fill the Dove even more than last time. If you are out of town then the forms are on the web. You can just email it to Cindy and I'll pass it on to the hanging committee ccockell@tbaytel.net

Remember to include a write-up with your quilt. People do stop to read the story behind the quilt; what inspired you, what techniques are used, how long it took, was it an original design or from a book/magazine etc. You should also acknowledge the person who

quilted it if it wasn't you. If it is for sale then make sure you have your business cards in a plastic sleeve or bag on the back of the quilt.

Sometimes we forget that new members don't know everything that goes on at the Show or other events we run. So if you have a question about the Show please ask at the meeting - someone else may be wondering the same thing.

We also have a special display at the show this year. Shirley Aussant and I had the same idea and the show committee and executive agreed with us. We are thrilled to announce that Helen Knights has agreed to be a first 'Superior Quilts Feature Quilter'. We hope future show committees continue this idea. We will have an area of the Dove building dedicated to Helen's work and she'll be there at various times throughout the show to chat with people about it. So don't forget to drop by and be inspired by her. May we all still be quilting at her age! Thank you Helen.

Banquet - Marg & Jennifer Marks will be in the lobby area selling banquet tickets. They also have the menu if you'd like to see it. The Banquet is on Saturday, April 30 at the Airlane. The tickets are \$35 for members and vendors and \$40 for non-members. This includes your meal, non-alcoholic punch + gratuity and entertainment. There will also be a cash bar.

Door Prizes - We also plan to have 30 door prizes - total prize value is currently over \$500 already and we only have half the prizes! If you have something to donate or can get a donation from a business you frequent then please do and let someone on the Show committee know. We'd like them no later than the April meeting so we can get things organized. Even a small item is OK since we'll make up gift baskets of smaller items. It doesn't have to be quilt related. We will acknowledge all donations and send a thank you note to the donor.

Vendors - The Merchant Mall is filling up due to a few last minute applications. We have a few new quilt shops from out of town this year. We have also invited a few artisans since we had a couple of booths left as of our March 1 deadline and we want the Heritage to break even. (Lynne Landy-Rody), Crystal's (Crystal Nelson - Grand Marais), Dori's Sewing Studio (Dori Hopko - Sioux Lookout), Gail's Stitches (Gail Green - Red Lake), One-of-a-Kind (Muriel Squires), Salavich's Serge & Sew (Marj Salavich - they're Husqvarna dealers too), JaKe's Originals (Karen Gobeil & Janice Sopko Ellingson - clothing), Purse-snickety (Marion Eastwood - felted purses), Cindy Cockell (jewellery & quilting stuff). There is still time if some members wanted to have a booth to sell stuff too, just talk to Leona, Nellie Jaremey or Cindy.

<u>Demos</u> - Louise and Sheila are still looking for people to sign up to do demos at the show. We would like to know by the end of March since this has to go into the program and Jennifer will be doing that early in April.

Advertising - the posters and bookmarks have been sent to all vendors who are in the show as well as out of town shops. They've also been dropped off a some local shops. Print media ads will be starting in April. Cindy will be on Around Town on April 25. But, this is your show too and you can help advertise it. Put up a poster at work or any place you go to that will let you put one up. Drop off some bookmarks to friends. The more we get the word out the more people visit the show. If you're new to the Guild you probably don't realize that this show helps us raise money to fund the charity events such as the quilt bee. So the more people we can get to attend the better it is.

Wristbands - Cindy should have the wristbands by the meeting. I'll be pre-selling the 3 day pass (\$10). The idea of pre-selling is so that we can limit the amount of cash on site and maybe lessen the work for the admission people.

Guild Booth - Cindy will have some more copies of some of the most popular patterns at the Feb. meeting. I hope everyone is busy making stuff. Louise did another show & tell at our meeting last week and she's made more cute things. Remember to bring all items to the April meeting so we can price and inventory them. Put them in a bag with your name on it. All items not sold at the show will be returned to the person who made them - but we hope we sell it all.

<u>Hostesses</u> - this is your chance to help out. We need 7-8 people for each 2 hour shift to either be a hostess in the quilt show (Dove), work in the Guild Booth (Heritage) or take admissions - both buildings. The

hostesses in the Dove have to watch over the quilts and Helen's area; the Guild Booth workers will be selling merchandise. Many hands make light work and we have a lot of fun at the show. The sign-up sheets will be in the lobby.

ORANGE OATMEAL MUFFINS

From More of Our Canada magazine - March 2011

Ingredients

1 cup rolled oats

1/2 cup orange juice

1/2 cup boiling water

1/2 cup butter

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1/3 cup white sugar

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. baking soda

3/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup raisins (optional)

- 1. Preheat oven 350*. Grease muffin tins or use paper liners.
- 2. Soak oats in orange juice and boiling water for 15 minutes.
- 3. In a large bowl, cream together butter and sugars. Beat in eggs and oat mixture.
- 4. In a separate bowl, combine the dry ingredients. Stir into batter. Stir in vanilla and raisins.
- 5. Spoon into prepared muffins 2/3 full.
- 6. Bake until golden brown about 20 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

She decided her designs would work as well in another medium and this went into a rug. When this was done she decorated the room around the rug. She then proceeded to redo each room. Each bedroom was planned around a "Helen" original, paintings etc. all originals planned by Helen. Her whole house is filled with her arts and crafts along with numerous items gathered from her many trips.

Her next venture was into quilted clothing. Who else would tackle strip piecing ultra suede into a magnificent coat? Helen has crafted many lovely articles which she proudly shows us.

One of Helen's greatest loves is her tours she has taken to India, Russia, Australia, New Zealand and Africa. On her return she hosts her many friends for an evening to tell and display her treasures. Her hospitality is unlimited.

When information is not available she tries to pass on anything she know about where to buy supplies or art information. She is still involved but now as a quilter but her art knowledge applies to any art form.

In her spare moments, Helen prepares hand crafted Christmas items for every member of her family-no small feat since her family members keep growing all the time. Her main interest today is quilting and she came to it in a round about way from her other art interests. She has long been a member of our guild and her enthusiasm and talents seem to spark any group she is in. With her knowledge and common sense approach and out going personality she is a most welcome member.
