One of the vendors, Linda Clark from Kenora had a wonderful booth and everyone was especially taken with her "Fabulous Fractures" pieces. On that note, she has been scheduled to teach the class for the Guild and will be joining us at the September meeting.

The class will be held over a two day period and will include the book:

### **FABULOUS FRACTURES**

Easy One-of-a-Kind Fractured Quilts A new approach to strip piecing pictorial quilts Author: Brenda Esslinger

Use the simple strip piecing techniques in this book to create an infinite array of stunning one of a kind fractured designs from large scale prints, panels, or your own digital images. The steps are beautifully illustrated with easy to understand language to make the process easy and fun!

From the Author:

Fractured quilts, "fractures" for short, are a way of making images more interesting and more attractive. They provide a view similar to what you would see in a fractured mirror, hence the name, or when looking through a teleidoscope (similar to a kaleidoscope, but with an open view).

Fractured quilts are made by taking more than one copy of an image, either a photo transfer or a commercially printed fabric, slicing each copy a bit differently, then sewing them back together to create an "exploded" image.

This book's purpose is to inspire you. I have included detailed instructions for the basic fracturing technique as well as two of its variations. You will only find one quilt pattern in this book. I have provided it as an example of how fractures can be worked into everyday quilts that are meant to be used.

We are still working on the exact dates for the classes, but they will be either on the Saturday and Sunday before the September meeting (September 17 and 18) with a trunk show on Monday, September 19 or the classes will be held on Sunday, September 18 and Monday, September 19 with the trunk show that evening at the meeting.

Linda has been sewing for almost 50 years and tried many other crafts – knitting, crochet, cross stitch, crewel, spinning and weaving. She even dabbled in stained glass and jewellery making, but after joining her local guild in 1990 she realized that she was born to quilt and thus began her new career – quilt designer, teacher and longarm quilter. As we continue to explore all those wonderful quilting books on the market, I am sharing four new books that I have recently ordered and cannot put back on the bookshelf. I find myself going through them over and over again.

### FEATURED BOOKS

### **SIMPLE STITCHES SEWING** by Cheryl Owen

If you are new to sewing dimensional projects or you just want some great inspiration, here it is. These beautifully photographed projects explained with step-by-step photo instructions will have you sewing stylish in no time. Projects include simple gifts, bags and home decor.

I am a visual learner, and it's easy for me to follow instructions when the photos are large and clear. The written instructions are a bonus for me! I love the easy-to-follow photos and instructions in Simple Stitches Sewing, I feel like it was written just for me. I'm going to keep this book first and front most in my library. The

projects are really simple and practical; from seat cushions and a picnic blanket to a potpourri sachet. I'm excited to try more than just one of these cute projects!

### BABY, IT'S YOU by Amy Hamberlin

Here's a collection of projects that's all about Baby and Mom. Each quilt is cute with just a little something different - it could be giant rickrack, applique, a ruffle, or a dimensional flower. The bag projects are just as clever with big pockets for bottles, grommets for scarves and more dimensional flowers. The bright colours and soft fabrics will bring giggles from Baby as well as happy smiles from Mom. Projects have clear instructions and include full-sized patterns.

*Techniques: piecing, applique, and general sewing* 10 projects – 56 pages

## **TABLETOP QUILTS BEST OF FONS & PORTER** by Various Designers

Catering to the quilter who loves decorating their home with charming, whimsical, and seasonal creations-this book has wonderful small projects that can be completed quickly. Whether it's something fun for an afternoon BBQ, or a gift to share some holiday spirit, each project is designed to be used in the kitchen, on the patio, and accent tables. The patterns are organized by season, showcasing vibrant flowers, soft scrappy looks, cheery holiday themes, traditional stars, and other favourites.

*Techniques: applique, piecing, and embroidery* 34 projects – 176 colour pgs

### **3 TIMES THE CHARM** by Barbara Groves & Mary Jacobson

It's time to grab your favourite charm packs and whip up these beautiful quick quilts. Each design is sewn up in three different colourways, so you get lots of inspiration. The projects are small, so they work well as baby quilts, wall hangings, or table toppers-it all depends on what kind of charm pack you choose to sew them with. You will want to get started right away cutting and piecing these cute quilts together.

As I turned the pages in this book I caught myself oohing and aahing over each project and was especially thrilled to see that they were quick & easy! All seven projects are made with charms ranging from 25 to 42 assorted prints and a minimum of additional yardage. The instructions are easy to follow and if you can cut

squares, rectangles, and strips and sew a straight seam, then this book is for you—even a beginning quilter will be delighted with her finished projects. For those of us who need a little visual aid, Barbara and Mary have shown each in three different fun, colourful options. I love it! Now all I have to do is start collecting charms packs in my favourite fabric finds; how fun will that be?!

### Things I Have Learned (or Muriel's Laws) You know, like Murphy's Law

- 1. If you want to get threads off a quilt top be sure to wear dark clothing, preferably black, and either corduroy or fleece, and the threads will just jump right off onto your clothing. (This works under the same principle as when your hair is partly black and partly grey the grey will fall out when you wear dark clothes, and the black will fall when you wear light clothing. Remember, opposites attract.)
- 2. If suggestion number 1 doesn't do the whole job make sure you take the quilt top to the living room as the thread, and the pins, will naturally be attracted to the living room furniture and the carpet. The threads and pins 'that weren't there' when you entered the living room will get energized and jump right into your husband's chair, or whatever part of the carpet he walks on.
- 3. If you want ultra cheap fabric, start a chain letter. You'll get lots of fabric in the mail, even though nobody else in the chain ever gets any.
- 4. If you have fabric "too precious to use" or 'to die for" and won't use it now, when you finally get to using it, it's not half as great as you'd remembered it. Or there's not enough of the fabric and you can't find more. Or there's a great fade line down the middle of it.
- 5. And those great ideas you get in the middle of the night, they're really not so hot in the morning. Or

the things you can't wait to make, while you're finishing up something you are only vaguely interested in making, are never as great when you finally get to work on them.

# THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD MEMBER PROFILE BETTY WHITTINGHAM

Although born in Sioux Lookout, I have lived my entire life in Thunder Bay.

My first encounter with fabric was in home ec class at Hillcrest High School, where I met fellow quilter Bobbie Dafoe, and we learned to sew straight seams, make aprons and a wonderful pink floral drindle skirt, which we thought we wore very well.

My mother made machine pieced and hand quilted quilts with the Knox United Church ladies group; little did I know that 35 years later I would also become a quilter.

Before being stricken with the quilting disease, I worked in the field of aquatics for 9 years teaching ladies fitness and learn to swim programs, special education swim classes for our local public schools, as well as adaptive programs for special needs children at Northwestern Regional Centre School (LPH).

In 1984, after presenting a demo on fabric picture frames at a guild meeting, I was invited by Helen Knights and the late Bea King, to join the guild, which I did on September 17, 1984.

Around 1986 we had a membership of approximately 60.

We began our guild library of which I became co-librarian; since there weren't a great number of quilt books on the market yet, we carried our book supply to each meeting at Ogden Street School, how our library has grown!

In 1992 I became quilt guild historian and following our guild's progress has been very interesting to me, not only to see our increase in membership, now around 165, I believe. As well as our community service, teaching methods, workshops and also our ever popular sharing of demos.

In 1997 I took on the chairing of the Hall of Fame committee and we have been able to induct many fine quilters into the hall with another 7 for induction this coming September.

Over the years and after a learning struggle, I have become very fond of applique, I also love machine piecing and hand quilting (I try to do at least one piece a year with only hand quilting). After seeing so few entries at our recent quilt show I fear hand quilting may become a lost art. It seems quantity has taken over with machine quilting.

I enjoy making a sample block first before my project. I try to pre-wash my fabrics, but if it's an art quilt that won't be washed I forego that. Lastly my love of miniature pieces. I love my tiny scraps - I store them in see through plastic bags by colour and size and file them for use in future minis. I take pictures of my quilts and finished pieces and store them in the computer.

I thought my interest in quilting would wane, but there is still so much more to learn. I am definitely afflicted with (Q.D.) quilter`s disease and there is no known cure.
