Christmas is that special time of the year when we take time to create so many wonderful things. One of the pleasures of the season has always been the special baking that we do, especially fruitcake. Either you love it or you don't, and I fall into the first category. With time being a precious commodity, I have included two very simple recipes that make up in no time at all using some everyday ingredients along with some fruit and nuts. Enjoy the fruitcake of your choice, or make both and have a very wonderful Christmas feast.

Fast and Fabulous Fruitcakes

Dark Fruitcake Ingredients

2 ½ cups flour

1 tsp. baking soda

2 eggs, slightly beaten

3 cups (1 28-oz. jar) mincemeat

1 can sweetened condensed milk

2 cups mixed candied fruit

1 cup walnuts, chopped OR 1 cup red or green glazed cherries

icing sugar for glazed icing garnish

Directions

- Preheat oven to 300 degrees F.
- Grease a 9-inch tube pan, line with waxed paper and grease again.
- Sift together flour and baking soda; set aside.
- In a large bowl, combine eggs, mincemeat, sweetened condensed milk, candied fruit and the

- nuts/cherries.
- Add dry ingredients and blend well. Pour into prepared pan.
- Bake 1 hour and 50 minutes. Test to check the cake is done.
- Cool 15 minutes. Turn out of pan; remove waxed paper.
- Garnish with dripped icing and decorate as desired.

Light Fruitcake

Ingredients

1 cup coconut

½ cup glazed fruit

1 cup mixed peel

½ cups almonds (sliced)

3 cups flour

2 tsp. baking powder

2 cups white sugar

4 eggs

1 cup butter

1 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup coconut

½ cup glazed fruit

½ cup almonds (sliced)

1 cup mixed peel

pinch of salt

Directions

- Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.
- Grease a 9-inch tube pan or round cake pan. Grease and flour the sides of the pan.
- In a large bowl, place all fruit and coconut. Set aside.
- In another large bowl, mix butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time. Add vanilla.
- Combine flour, baking powder and salt, and add to butter/egg mixture.
- Add milk and blend well.
- Add the fruit/coconut mixture to the cake batter. Mix well and pour into cake pan.
- Bake at 325 degrees for 1 and ½ hours. Test the centre of the cake before removing from the oven. Cool 15 or 20 minutes before removing from the pan.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD MEMBER PROFILE STELLA LEITERMAN

Stella was born in Bromhead, Sask.-population 200, and was related to most towns people. She and her sister and parents moved to Vickers Heights area in the south ward. It was here Stella attended Fort William Collegiate.

Stella majored in nursing and accepted employment with a local obstetrician, Dr. Chapman. She was soon able to purchase her first sewing machine. Since she had a young family to clothe , she decided to purchase a Neechi-Bernina rather than a Singer as it had reverse sewing capability. At this time girls didn't wear slacks to school only dresses were allowed., so she enrolled in a sewing class

In 1981 guild member, the late May Carlson, taught a quilting class at Hammarskjold High School and then at Pine Street School. This was the beginning of the Monday night quilt group, of which Stella is one the remaining members. The group still meets twice monthly at the 55t center and are known as the "nifty needlers"

Stella is a 27 year member of the guild and also co-chaired the guild library back when the membership was only 25-30. She has participated in many of the guild endeavours and is a "96 hall of fame" member and has been an inspiration to her daughter Karen, who is also a guild member. Stella enjoys piece-work, making quilted clothes, handbags and wall hangings and has kept hand quilting long after machine quilting became more popular.

Stella and her late husband Ron were very community minded having volunteered many times packing Christmas hampers and visiting hospital patients to name a few.

Stella enjoys working on smaller projects and still has that wonderful gift of a great sense of colour.
