#### PHOTO WALL ART

#### **Styrofoam**

Buy the 2' by 8' sheet of insulation Styrofoam. Cut it in 12 blocks measuring 7 ½" by 8" with a saw or knife. Will have lots left.

#### **Material**

I made 7 printed cotton blocks and 5 photo blocks as the seem to arrange nice this way. Cut the 7 printed cotton blocks at 11 ½ " by 12" from several different prints. I used black and white but any colours or prints will be good as long as you have some theme going. Cut the plain cotton blocks for the Photo blocks at 8 ½" by 11" the exact size as your computer paper. Make extra of these as mistakes during printing will happen. Will also need 2 ½" strips to sew on three sides of these blocks. Cut 12 blocks of quilt batting 7 3/4" by 8 1/4".

#### Computer

Spray plain block cotton with a good basting spray and fit computer paper exactly over the top of this.

Carefully smooth cotton and paper so there are no bubbles. When dry place in computer paper holder so that the computer will print on material side. Place your picture CD in computer or find the pictures you want in your picture files. Select picture and stretch so that it cover the entire screen and will fit the top of the block. Print with colour or black and white. Be careful not to smudge the material until it dries completely then remove paper.

#### **Putting it Together**

Place printed block of cotton face down. On top of this centre batting square, then Styrofoam block. Put glue all around the top edge of block 1" wide. Bring material up and cut corners and fold into corners gluing on top. Straight pins may be needed to hold material until dry. (Use a Tacky glue or Gorilla Glue which is my favourite. Photo block needs to have 3 strips sewn on to 3 edges so it will fit the block. Make sure seams are on the edges of the block. Cover the Styrofoam blocks with this material making sure picture is straight. May spray photo blocks with a matte spray which may look yellow until dry.

# THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD MEMBER PROFILE CLAIRE ARCHER

I was an only child, born in Winnipeg but raised mainly in northwestern Ontario. I am a retired Occupational Health Nurse.

I took Home Economics in grade 7 and 8 and all through high school. It was there that I learned the basics in all kinds of needlework and sewing. I also learned that most of what I learned came from the mistakes that I made! I sewed most of my clothes and most of my kids clothes when they were little. I still enjoy sewing. My hobbies are sewing, quilting, needlework, and reading. I used to do a lot of gardening till I moved into an apartment.

I started quilting in the early 1990's. I like to quilt in the fall and winter – usually to get Christmas quilt projects done.

I prefer to do the piecing part of a quilt because that's where I see the most progress and I get to play with fabric and colour. Colourful fabric is an addiction for me and I usually will buy anywhere from a metre to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  metres, often on speculation and just because I like that particular piece of fabric. I save the larger left over pieces particularly when there is a coordinating fabric with it and store them in rubber maid containers and clear bins.

I prewash all my fabric and store them in the cupboard in colour families. I started taking pictures of finished projects just in the last couple of years and when it is allowed I will take pictures at quilt shows and then put them in an album.

Pressing and ironing are an essential part of any sewing if you are going to get a sharp image and finish on your project. My Home Ec. Teacher, Mrs. Walsh, said "you sew with your iron" if you want a professionally finished garment. She "brainwashed" us so it doesn't feel right to skip that step.

I haven't used spray starch before cutting but I like Mary Ellen's Best Press clear starch alternative when pressing a work in progress.

I use a seam ripper for reverse sewing. It is much more efficient than using a pin. I cut the thread every 3-4 stitches and pull the bobbin thread and it works quite quickly that way.

I don't usually do a trial block, just jump right in with both feet. If I hit a "road block", the mentors in our quilt group are helpful in showing me how to get out of it.

I have travelled to other places for quilt shows, primarily, as a viewer. I haven't wanted to trust my sewing machine to an airline.

My best sewing tips are: make sure that you have good quality tools – fabric, threads, and needles, and scissors/rotary cutters - and good lighting. Do at least one block the long way, before trying short cuts.

I seem to need a lot of room to spread out fabric. I keep bundles of triangles, squares, etc. In zip lock bags to keep them organized. The 12 inch containers for projects are helpful as well.

I have been with the guild since 1998. I have been in the "hanging group" for the Quilt shows 3 times now and helped out at the quilt bee. I was with Julie Cullen for 2 years distributing Donation quilts. I showed my quilts at guild as the quilter of the month.

I have enjoyed being part of the guild and the camaraderie of the group. These women have taught me a lot and have given me a lot of encouragement and help. I wouldn't have done anywhere near the number of projects I have done if it hadn't been for the workshops and ideas that I got from this group.

I love sewing and quilting and it is great to share it with like minded people!!!
