In my humble opinion, it has been an exciting two years working with a great Executive and Committee Chair members. The meetings were lively and exciting. Members were enthusiastic and brought along so much show and tell and the monthly programs inspired new thoughts and ideas.

In this my last report, I have some exciting news to share with the membership. As one of my last duties, I have invited CHERYL ARKINSON of Calgary, AB to be our guest speaker at the 2013 Quilt Show Banquet along with her trunk show and a two day workshop on the Saturday and Sunday of the Quilt Show.

Her workshop "SCRAP MANAGEMENT" will cover sorting, storing and using your scraps, based on the information provided in *Sunday Morning Quilts*, her book co-written with Amanda Jean Nyberg. Participants will complete the workshop with sorted scraps, concrete ideas for storing those scraps when they return home, including a scrap storage box, and a completed quilt top.

Each participant will get to pick one quilt in Sunday Morning Quilts to construct from their scraps, but it will be personalized from your scraps, to suit your style. She can also work with participants on their own scrappy design.

The goal is to get quilters to organize and see their scraps as an inspiring sight, not a burden or a mess. If we tackle the scraps right away then 1) there won't be as

many scraps to take home and 2) each participant gets a completed quilt top.

Only 15 participants for this workshop, and registration will start at the September meeting. We are anticipating a class fee of \$120.00 per person for this two day workshop. Remember that space will be limited, so if you are interested make sure to sign up at the September meeting. A \$50.00 deposit will be required when you sign up to guarantee your spot for this fabulous April 2013 workshop.

TINY BORDERS

I wanted to put a 1/8" or 1/4" border around a wall hanging I was doing but I find it's hard to cut that tiny strip, sew it on and press it so it's even all the way around. Then I came up with this idea. I cut my borders 1" and sewed them as usual then pressed to the border. Now I laid my long ruler on the seam I just sewed and trimmed the border strip to the width I wanted the border + 1/4" for the seam allowance (so I trimmed it to 1/2" to end up with a 1/4" border). Result was a nice straight edge to sew the next border to.
