QUILT SAYINGS FOR YOU TO ENJOY

Proquiltination – the art of putting off till tomorrow anything and everything except quilting. Quilting fills my days – not to mention the bedrooms and cupboards.

When life throws you scraps, make a quilt.

Old quilters don't die – they just go to pieces.

My grand daughter came to spend a few weeks with me. I decided to teach her to sew and began by showing her how to thread the sewing machine. She looked at me in wonder: 'You can do all that but you can't set the timer on the TV?'

A messy house is a sign of a happy quilter.

I'm a material girl – want to see my fabric collection?

I'm a fabric accumulation expert.

May all your ups and downs in life be with a needle and thread.

If I quilt fast enough, does that count as aerobic exercise?

Blessed are the children of the piecemakers, for they shall inherit the quilts.

My husband said that if I bought any more fabric he would leave me – I'll miss him! Asking a quilter to hem your skirt is like asking Picasso to paint your bathroom.

Dear fabric store worker: Stop asking me what I'm going to make with this fabric – I've run out of different ways of saying that it will go in my fabric stash.

Sure – bring the family over. My wife's working on a quilt, so bring your own food and dishes. Oh and a folding table if you have one.

If you stick your tongue out while quilting, your quilting accuracy improves by 100%.

I don't need to get organized, I just need a bigger sewing room.

Fabric is so addictive that it should be a controlled substance.

To quilt or not to quilt – what a silly question!

All of your questions about life after death will be answered if you touch my fabric stash.

When life gives you scraps, make quilts.

You know you're a quilter if you pet fabric.

I cannot count a day complete, till needle thread and fabric meet.

A day patched with quilting seldom unravels.



Potato Chip Cookies Cindy Cockell

These are like a cross between shortbread and sugar cookies.

1 c. margarine or butter. I used hard Parkay margarine ½ c. sugar 1 tsp vanilla

Cream these ingredients well then add:

½ c crushed potato chips (regular salted like Lays or Old Dutch plain). Crush them pretty fine like bread crumbs but OK if there's a few lumps.

Mix together then add: 2 c. flour

Mix again. If the dough seems dry grab a handful and knead it until smoother.

Then form into small balls (about 1"). Place on ungreased or very lightly greased cookie sheet. Dip the bottom of a flat glass into sugar then press down on balls. Sugar the glass between each cookie. I press them down to about ¼" thick. They do spread a bit when cooking. I sometimes dip the glass in sugar a 2nd time and just touch the top of each cookie again so there's a bit more sugar.

 Bake 350 F for 15-17 minutes (or until slightly browned at edges). They bake fast so watch the first batch to see how long it takes in your oven

The cookie tin I had at the Guild meeting was a double batch. The large bag of Lays easily does a double batch, probably even a triple batch.

TIE PURSE

(borrowed from workshop by Lila Hetzler – March 2008)

Supplies: 1 Tie, 1/3 yd for lining (a fat quarter will make 2 linings), 1/3 yd of muslin (to stabilize), 1 ¼ yd cording for strap, 12 inches of 3/8 inch wide elastic.

Flap: Cut 6 inches from tip of tie for the flap. Do not remove the lining or interfacing. If silk or material likely to fray- you may want to stitch first on both sides of cutting line.

Purse: Measure the remainder of the tie. You will need six 7 ½ inch pieces from the remainder unless the tie is really wide. Do not include the bottom tip in your measure or the cut. Note: Adjust the length of pieces if you have a longer or shorter tie. Also, you won't need 6 pieces if you have a wide tie so you can cut 5 longer pieces and have more options in layout). Remove the thread and interfacing from these pieces (note: I have removed the interfacing before cutting on some to ensure my pattern will flow and the cut is straight). Press flat. Sort the pieces so you have a larger piece for both the front and back, other pieces go on both sides of the main piece. Sew pieces together and press seams outward. Place muslin pattern on tie pieces, mark pattern for purse, and sew around within the ¼ inch seam allowance. Trim excess tie away and clip the curves, if needed. Sew the front and back (pretty sides) together around the sides and bottom.


Lining: Cut two pieces for lining. Sew the sides and bottom (pretty sides) together leaving a 3 inch opening in the bottom.

Layout: Designate a front for the purse and baste the flap to the back piece (pretty sides together) and stitch the strap ends to the side seams. Place the tie bag inside lining (pretty sides together) and stitch around the top. Turn the bag by pulling through opening in the lining. Press. Make a casing by starting near one side seam and stitching 5/8 inch width and leave about 1½ inch open to feed elastic through (using a safety pin). Overlap the elastic ends, stitch, then finish stitching the openings in the casing and lining.

Embellish with a button or other decorations on the flap, in the side seams, on the bag...... just remember to have fun with this project and put some love into it. You can make several versions (classic, fun, themed, totally decorated,...)

Hints: diagonal prints can be tricky to match. Works best with abstract or overall pattern to tie. Also, the fabric texture makes a lot of difference. If a firmer fabric, the muslin is not needed. An additional idea is to include a pocket. When using Dad's old tie – why not use his old shirt for the lining?

Final thought: you may want to embellish with pins that can be removed so the purse can be washed.



Seeing Squares Place Mat

Finished size approximately 12 1/2" wide by 17 1/2" long

A total of four different fabrics are used these placemats.



Fabric Requirements

Four Placemats

Fabric A - 0.25 meters

Fabric B - 0.25 meter

Fabric B - 0.40 meters

Fabric C - 0.35 meters

Binding Fabric - 0.55

Batting - 0.40 meters (based on 90" wide batting)

Backing - 0.75 meters

Suggested Fabrics

100% Cotton fabrics

Cutting

Four Placemats


Fabric A - Cut one 6 ½" strip Sub cut into 4 - 6 ½" squares

Fabric B - Cut two 3 ½" strip Sub cut into 16 - 3 ½" squares

Fabric C - Cut two - 6 ½" strip Sub cut into 16 - 6 ½" x 3 ½" pieces

Fabric D - Cut three - 3" strips Sub cut into 8 - 12 ½" x 3" pieces

Binding - cut 7 strip - 2 1/2" wide



Putting it Together

These instructions are for one placemat. Each placemat is put together the same way.

Taking one 6 ½ square from fabric A - attach two pieces from fabric C (6 ½" x 3 ½") on opposite sides of the square. Stitch and press

seam allowances to center square. Take two 3 ½"

squares from fabric B and two pieces from fabric C (6 ½" x 3 ½), stitch one square on each end of fabric C. Stitch and press seam allowances to smaller outside squares.

Now attach one of the complete Fabric B and Fabric C units on either side of the Fabric C and Fabric A sets. Repeat on the opposite side. This will now give you one complete 9-Patch unit measure 12 ½" square.

Line up one of the 3" x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips on one side of the complete 9-Patch. Stitch in place and press seam allowance to outside. Repeat on opposite side.

One placemat is now complete - repeat with additional placemats.

Finishing Up

Using a method of you choice, arrange and baste the backing, batting and the placemats together. Quilt as desired.

Trim away excess backing and batting once the quilting is complete. Attach your precut strips of binding together with diagonal seams to form a strip of binding long enough to go around the complete outside of the quilt.
