2018 QUILT SHOW - DRYDEN

Considering visiting the Sunset Country Quilters Guild's 2018 "Autumn Splendor" Quilt Show? Whether you are a guest or exhibitor, there are some basic show guidelines that will ensure you have a successful experience.

The Dryden and area's Sunset Country Quilters Guild displays quilted articles entered by its members, and also the public, to showcase their skills. This is not a judged or juried show, but for exhibit only, although a select few articles are 'For Sale'. The only prize awarded at this bi-annual show is the "Viewer's Choice Award" which is awarded as the result of the anonymous voting taking place by the viewing public during the two day event. In the quilting world, the pleasure of seeing a collection of quilts all in one place is inspiring, and encourages others to challenge their creative abilities.

You are sure to be in awe of the variety of quilts and other items; amazing workmanship, phenomenal expertise in style, colour, and skill - incredible works of fibre art.

In recent Sunset Country Quilters' Quilt Shows, held bi-annually, members' miniature quilts were made available through a silent auction held at the quilt show's evening banquet. Because participation was limited to only banquet attendees, this year we are moving the Silent Auction to the Quilt Show, opening it up to a much larger audience. If you are interested in participating and are looking to donate a mini quilt, check out the guidelines on our website www.sunsetcountryquilters.org. The form to accompany your donation(s) is also available on the website.

Of course, regional vendors will have retail booths at the show, along with several workshops. The Tea Room will be open for the two days. Tickets are now available from any member for your chance to win the gorgeous Raffle Quilt which will be on display.

One of the first things you'll notice as you enter the exhibit hall is the offering of free "white gloves". Because oils and perfumes from the skin surface can damage the fabric or workmanship, these gloves are available to assist viewers with seeing (and not touching) the cherished quilted items. Leave no fingerprints behind! Another courtesy is that you ask permission prior to taking photographs of the entries on display.

If you plan on entering a quilted item, keep in mind that smoke is particularly unpleasant as it can migrate to other nearby quilts. Placing the quilt into a plastic bag, even temporarily, can actually make the odour worse and is not recommended. If there is smoker in your house, air the quilt well prior to the show. Another aspect of getting a quilt "show ready" is making sure that the quilt is free of assembly markings. All quilted articles which leave your home should be labeled with the quilter's name, full address, home and cell phone numbers, email or website information, and date. The entry rules will provide label protocol.

And finally, carefully check the rules for specific instructions on how to retrieve your quilt at the end of the show. Security is an ongoing issue for all quilters, and we take it seriously. Follow the Guild's guidelines regarding signing for pick up. The ladies of the Guild will re-pack your items in the cloth bag you provided, and make it available for signing and pick up shortly after the show's closing on Sunday.

The Quilt Bee committee has been busy getting kits ready for you to pick out and sew during the Bee. We have new patterns and more beautiful colour combinations. Come out for the day and help us to create beautiful quilts for our community. The Bee will be held from 10 am - 4 pm. If you are able to come out to join us, please sign up at the January meeting so we can have an idea of the numbers to expect. It will help with the room setup and it will help us to know how much food to order. Lunch will be provided. If you can bring a dessert to share, please do. It will be enjoyed! Please be sure to mark your food with any specific allergens like nuts and dairy.

If you can't make it for the whole Bee, you are welcome to join us for part of the day. We always need help with pressing, trimming and more pressing. If you can't bring your sewing machine, there will be tasks to help with (like pressing) and we encourage you to join us.

If you are coming to the Bee please plan to bring your name tag, your sewing machine, sewing notions, thread, and a covered coffee mug. Please bring a power bar and extension cord for your sewing machine. You may need your rotary cutter and ruler to trim half square triangles, make strips or trim blocks.

Thank you to everyone who helped to prepare kits and cut fabric either at home or at the Cutting Bee. Your efforts have made it easy to create beautiful kits and will provide the opportunity to make unique quilts during the Bee. We hope to see you on January 27 at the Bee.

COMFORT QUILTS

Greetings Fellow Quilters,

There were 2 comfort quilts and 12 squares turned in at the December meeting. Thanks to Jannette and Marie for the ideas for blocks but remember that you can make any quilt square and then sandwich it with cotton or cotton/poly batting and a backing fabric to make a quilted square that should measure a minimum of 12.5 inches (so start with a 14 inch piece for backing and batting). Don't trim your blocks as they may fray so blocks should be trimmed just prior to making the quilt tops. Almost any colours can be used but we recommend using a neutral backing and would like colours that will appeal to both males and females.

Neutrals such as blues, greens, browns, beige, reds,....

If you are making any quilt(s) for donation, the recommended sizes are given here. Also, see Florence for a Quilt Guild Label. A label is to be sewn onto the quilt – typically on the back bottom right side. Also remember that these quilts are washed frequently so stitching be every 4 to 6 inches. Thanks

If you have suggestions for worthy locations. We would need to know the potential use, number, appropriate size(s) and description of the recipients (ie. Male and Female, seniors or

Enjoy the sewing and I (Pat) will see you in March. Florence Poster will be available if there are any questions.



36 Jacob Ladder Blocks.


Page 6.

Step 6. This is what you have been waiting for: You should have:

- 49 9 Patch blocks 9
- 84 Snowball SB
- 28 Half snowballs H
- 28 Plain squares P
- 36 Jacob Ladders JL
- 225 Total

Note: The way the H's are set on the edges of the diagram and the way the JL change directions.
