The Guild is sponsoring this project swap and supporting the members in the purchase of the "Sisterhood" pattern by Berene Campbell. Each participant will need to pay \$5.00 for the pattern. The pattern is paper pieced and will be available only to those members who participate in the swap. The material will come from your stash. Please use 5 different low volume materials for the background. Members will be assigned to a group of 8 for the purposes of the swap. There will be a presentation at the February Guild Meeting about this swap.

By participating in the Sisterhood Swap, you are committing yourself to make **eight of one section of the pattern**, as assigned by the Swap Committee. To ensure everyone receives the correct number of sections for the block, you will keep one section and send the other seven sections you made to the other members in your group. You will then receive the seven other sections required to complete the pattern from your group members. The finished block will be **16 inches square**.

Registration must be received by March 1st, with the \$5.00 payment to the Guild. Groups and patterns will be emailed or available in print to you (at an extra cost) by March 8th. Finished sections of the block must be mailed by May 1st.

It is hoped that the blocks will be completed by the June meeting for our Show and Tell. The Swap Committee is looking forward to seeing what we all can do together. Blocks can be made into a bag as shown, or can be used to make a quilt if a number of groups want to do so.

NORTHCOTT 2021 CHALLENGE

I hope everyone is working on their challenge quilts so that we have a beautiful wall of quilts to showcase our talent. All the fat quarters have been purchased and there is a limited amount of fat eighths available. They will be sold on a first come, first serve basis. **Fat eights are available for \$5**. Payment for the challenge fabric will be **cash or etransfer only to Ellen Lang**. Contact Ellen Lang at 623-2307 or by email at ellen_lang@tbaytel.net if you are interested to arrange payment and coordinate pickup.

The challenge quilts will be displayed as part of the Grand Nations Crossroads Fibre Arts exhibition at the Thunder Bay Museum from July 13 – Sept 17, 2021. **The quilts will be hung on dowels so each quilt will require a hanging sleeve**. The hanging sleeve is basically a tube that is the length of your quilt and will fit your thumb. Both top and bottom of the hanging sleeve will need to be sewn to the top back of the quilt. **You also must label your quilt on the back only** – not on the front. Your label must include your name.

A few reminders about the challenge:

- 1. Create a wall hanging or quilt that can be hung. The quilt must be quilted & bound.
- 2. Maximum dimensions 36" x 36".
- 3. Must use all 3 challenge fabrics provided in the front of the quilt, not including the binding.
- 4. The 3 challenge fabrics must be prominent in the quilt.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to create an original design.
- 6. Only use 3 additional fabrics to create your original design.
- 7. A hanging sleeve is required on the back to accommodate a dowel. See above for the description
- 8. A label (on the back of the quilt) with your name.
- 9. Deadline for submission has changed to end of May 2021. Drop off location will be announced at a later date.

Tools and Extras

You don't need any special tools to design a quilt top. Graph paper can be helpful and a calculator always helps us with quilt math. Remember that when you have a seam you lose 1/2 inch every time. Simple quilt math skills and trial and error can help every time.

A design wall or a large area on a floor, bed or wall can help with planning your layout. Sketching your plan before you leave it will help you to pick up where you left off next time.

Your phone or tablet with a digital camera is another great tool. Take photos of your layout plans and look at them on your camera. Remember to revisit the colour and quilts program from September when we shared tips on using black and white photos to look for balance in your quilt top.

On -Point Setting

Setting quilts on point can lead to some tricky math and bias edges. Blossom Heart Quilts has a great tutorial on how to calculate the size of triangles you need to make your quilt top work on point.

Layout Ideas for Quilt Tops

The Polka-dot Chair website has some great ideas for how to layout square blocks. She explores numerous ideas, some traditional and some more modern with negative space.

Sampler Quilt Block Layout Ideas | The Polka Dot Chair

Layouts to Consider for Square Blocks

Simple Grid—square grid layout with every block being the same as the previous. Blocks are stacked in a square grid pattern.

Alternating Blocks—This quilt layout would consist of two blocks, on a square grid, with every other block being a solid square.

Offset Blocks—Blocks set like bricks where each block is offset from the previous row by 1/2 or 1/3 of the width of the block.

Sashing and Cornerstones—add sashing and cornerstones to separate blocks from one another.

Rows or Columns— arrange your blocks in rows or columns and separate them with complementary fabrics.

Embellish your Blocks—add star points to your blocks to make them the center show-piece of a new larger star block.

FIDGET KITS

The fidget kits have a variety of fabrics and doodads to utilize in making interesting squares. 21 ideas are listed and your imagination can add many more once you get started. Texture and colour are crucial for the fabrics which are typically 6" to 7" single squares. A PSW at Roseview mentioned that a single square with one repetitive activity for each person is much better than a whole series as it is too confusing to the client. They also tend to claim it as their own, so many single ones can be better used.

- 1. Small raw edged pockets from denim appeal to men, particularly if keys, old plastic cards are attached so they can be easily slipped in and out.
- 2. The narrow end of a colourful necktie is a natural for a large buttonhole to slip on and off a well sewn on button.
- 3. Prairie points with the fuzzy half of Velcro sewn on the underside are easy to pull off from the matching Velcro hook side. It also makes a noise!
- 4. Three thick nylon ropes, each a different colour, can be braided, twisted, tied or pulled to their knotted ends
- 5. Several beads from junk jewelry can be slid back and forth on a secure string. If you have small bells, this is an added attraction.
- 6. The old metal zippers are sturdy and can be pulled up and down forever.
- 7. The single side of plastic zippers can be cut into 6" strips and doubled into a loop, sewn opposite an other to represent shoe eyelets. A long shoelace can be doubled and used to thread through back and forth.
- 8. Weaving can be done using three or five strands of nylon rope forming the weft on a simple loom. Use a thick yarn for the warp. I harden the end with white glue.
- 9. Loops of ribbons in different sizes and colours are always popular.
- 10. Loops of elastic in different widths sewn on opposite sides of the block provide stretchability
- 11. Polar fleece strips cut on the proper grain also afford a fuzzy stretch opportunity.
- 12. The small Gutermann spools pull apart and fit back together. Thread them so the two parts do not get lost.
- 13. Thread two serger tubes so they can be fit together; push, pull. These do not have to be attached to a fidget block. If you are able to sew these across into rings, they can be quite suitable for big, medium and small interlocking rings on a rope.
- 14. Old plastic curlers of different sizes can serve the same purpose.
- 15. Knit or crochet a 3" granny square from thick yarn and attach to a square.
- 16. Wide lace or embroidered panels can be stitched so fingers can fit into the spaces. Do not make the spaces so wide that food can be hidden inside!
- 17. Pompons from yarn are always touchy feely. Just be sure they are securely stitched or it can become bald quite quickly.
- 18. Patches of fake fur encourages petting for calmness.
- 19. Grommets sewn on at random can be threaded with the nylon rope whose end has either been hardened in white glue or singed to prevent fraying.
- 20. Fringes are always good for touchy-feely experiences.
- 21. Thread a spool onto a block so it can be rolled up and down, back and forth.

The blocks can be finished off by serging, binding, or pillow slipping. In some cases, you could have another technique on the back for a reversible block. Also a loop of some sort is recommended so the fidget square can be attached to a wheelchair arm.

leftover and is willing to continue making more quilts if we collect additional squares. Also, Members participating in the Sisterhood Swap may enjoy making additional blocks and quilt them as 16" squares that Jackie can use to hinge bed quilts. If you have any questions, contact me.

We hope that additional quilts can be provided to the Crossroads Centre and Wesway. Wesway has 12 Respite beds and has requested our assistance to brighten them up with bed or nap quilts. Male friendly patterns and colours are most needed.

The Regional Hospital and senior facilities received some fidget quilts and would appreciate obtaining additional fidgets of any kind (marble mazes, muffs, taggy blankets or activity squares). I have some starter kits if you are interested. The Guild website has suggestions and there are many YouTube videos if you are looking for ideas. Additional photos of samples or patterns will be added to our website, as available. Your suggestions are also welcomed. Cathy found some wonderful patterns for knitted muffs.....and crochet works well too. The fidgets are particularly enjoyed by dementia patients. If you have fun with them other will enjoy them too!

Please let us know if you would like a kit of fidget starter materials or have donations of fidgets, quilted squares, or comfort quilts (except children's quilts until facilities are able to use these). We can arrange for drop offs or pickups for these items.
