COMFORT QUILTS

Greetings,

Hopefully everyone enjoyed their summer and outdoor activities. I managed to complete a couple of projects and start a few more. If you have finished a comfort quilt, figit or some quilted 12 ½ inch squares, please let me know and a drop off can be arranged or these items can be left with Katrina at Sew Flippin Creations.

Comfort quilts are made by Guild members from kits provided for the Quilt Bee or donated fabrics. The quilts and figits are collected and distributed within the

community to hospitals, seniors' homes, transition and treatment centres. Committee members collect the donations, meet to sort and discuss distribution then deliver to the many facilities. Typically, the Guild collects and provides over 200 comfort quilts each year through the generosity of members. Comfort Quilts are frequently washed so they need to be securely sewn and quilted. Labels are sewn onto the quilts except the small figits. Please let me know if you need labels.

Figit quilts are small projects that entertain and calm seniors and individuals with anxiety. They can be made in a variety of sizes and can be simple marble maze squares or taggy blankets or activity lap quilts. Some examples and hints are available on the website and many excellent YouTube videos exist. If you have questions or would like a starter kit, let me know.

Thanks to Jackie Black numerous bed-sized quilts have been made using the hinge method and the 12 ½ inch quilted squares collected. If you have orphan blocks or extra squares from making a quilt, these can be used to make a quilted square. Please use cotton or cotton/poly batting and a neutral (plain colours or light patterns) backing for making the squares. Your backing and batting should start off slightly larger to allow some shrinkage when quilting. Making squares is a fun way to try out various patterns and practice some quilting techniques.

Bed-sized quilts and figits have been identified as the most needed items however there is need for all sizes for different facilities. Suggested sizes are provided for guidance. The Committee has a listing of facilities and is always interested in added more, where needed. A key objective is to provide to places where the quilts benefit multiple users. If you know of any suggested places, provide a contact and some background information on the facility.

Please consider joining the Comfort Quilt Committee this year. It is rewarding to see how much the donations are appreciated at the facilities. There are typically three or four meeting of members to sort, photograph and distribute the donations.



- **Quilt Show Challenge** Ellen put this info in a separate submission. Northcott Fabrics once again generously donated 3 bolts of fabric. This is the 40th anniversary celebration so the theme color is ruby. We are working on a way to pick up the kits in person.
- **Vendors** We should have a full house for vendors (hoping for 10). Vicky and Jeannette have been in contact with lots of shops and we should have a better idea of who is coming in the next 2 months.
- **Demos** Cathy Ridley will be asking people if they'd like to do a short demo at the show. If you'd like to do one then contact her with your idea. Once again, we aren't going to charge for the demo itself. The only charge would be for a kit if there is one for the demo.
- Café Tonia Heng (Guild member) will be providing the food and beverages at the show.
- **Guild Booth** I have 1 person volunteer to help organize the booth but we need a few more people for this committee. This committee sets up the products for sale in the Guild Booth on the Thursday before the show, prices the products, keeps track of inventory and sales, then dismantles the booth after the show closes. So please let me know if you are interested. I (Cindy) have done it for many years and I can give you some help and lend you display units if need be.
- Registration/Deregistration I have nobody for this committee yet but it isn't a critical committee at this time. As long as we have it by March. SUPERIOR QUILTS 2023 CHALLENGE

RUBY ANNIVERSARY



In 2021 the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild celebrated our 40th anniversary which is considered our 'ruby' anniversary. For the 2023 Superior Quilt challenge the committee has decided to celebrate this achievement. Guess what colour the fabric is!

Once again Northcott Fabrics has graciously provided 3 bolts of fabric for our challenge. Each bolt has been divided into fat quarters and fat eighths and are now available for purchase.

There is a limited amount of fat quarters and fat eighths available. It will be sold on a first come, first serve basis. Fat quarters can be purchased for \$10 and fat eights for \$5. Payment for the challenge fabric will be cash only. The fabric bundles will be available for purchase at any library night, Vickers Heights sew days and any social that the Guild has. For out of town members please contact Ellen Lang for mailing options.

More details to follow but here are some highlights:

- 1. Create a wall hanging or quilt that can be hung. The quilt must be quilted & bound.
- 2. Maximum dimensions 36" x 36".
- 3. Must use all 3 challenge fabrics provided in the front of the quilt, not including the binding.
- 4. The 3 challenge fabrics must be prominent in the quilt.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to create an original design.
- 6. Only use 3 additional fabrics to create your original design.

Deadline for submission is April 17, 2023.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD HISTORY

Looking Back.... a retrospective of the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild – 1981 to present

As many of you know, 2021 was the 40th anniversary of the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild. But due to covid, we could not celebrate the 40th at our quilt show that year. So, throughout this year I will be writing about the history of the Guild, showcasing a few years each month. There will also be a Power Point of the Guild history at the show. The quilt show in May 2023 will also be a celebration of 40+ years. Where possible I will include pictures from the era. If anyone has anything to contribute, please let me know.

I'd like to thank our quilting fore-mothers for founding the Guild and starting on this celebration of quilts and quilting and the friendships we all share because of it. From our humble beginnings of these first few ladies with no technology we've grown to a Guild of about 150 members with the world of quilting available at a click of the keyboard. We've come a long way in 40yrs. And we continue to grow and evolve with new ideas and tools for quilting.

How it started (this month 1981-1984):

Back in the early 1980's there were a few people quilting in the area but nothing organized. A few ladies met and decided to try to see if there were like-minded people. I believe Jackie Black posted a notice asking if anyone was interested in quilting and that started the ball rolling. I remember working at Fabricland around this time and was always in awe of the quilters when they came in – I was a garment sewer and quilting was foreign to me at the time. Their fabric had to be ripped and they put so many colors and patterns together. Their fabric choices were nothing like we have today!

March 1981 – Elenore Kehlenbeck chaired a get together of the interested ladies at the National Exhibition Center (now CLE). By April 1981 the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild was formed by 12 members and an executive was elected in June. The first executive was:

President: Beatrice King

Vice Presidents: Elenore Kehlenbeck & Sue Beevor

Secretary: Deloraine Papich

Treasurere: Pat Angus

For the first few years the meetings were held at various locations like Ogden School, Algonquin School, Vance Chapman School, St. Dominic's Church, NEC, and potluck meetings at Helen Knights' house. Right from the start the focus was on sharing ideas on quilting, celebrating all things quilting, helping other and friendship.

Membership fees were set at \$10/year and \$5 for seniors. You were fined 25 cents for not wearing your name tag (that practice continued for many years). By the end of June 1981 there were 32 members.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD HISTORY

The Guild started to draft a Constitution and began forming the ideas of what the Guild should be. They held a contest to design a logo and Jo Baarocher was the winner. Her design was based on the various colors of amethyst in the area. This continued to be our logo until fairly recently.



January to June of 1982 saw various members give presentations. Sue Beevor and Jackie Black (quick cutting methods). A new tool was now available, the rotary cutter – can you imagine quilting without it these days. Rulers were also just coming out; before that templates were often used. Elenore Kehlenbeck demoed various ways to make a log cabin block, Jackie Black demoed Seminole piecing. There was a landscape workshop at Quetico. They also did a display of antique quilts in April at the NEC (now CLE).

By 1982 there were some new products available at Fabricland: rotary cutters and colored quilting thread. The group designed a formal name tag. The Guild joined the Ontario Arts Council for 1 year. By the end of June 1982 there were 57 members, including 1 male. They had \$500 in the bank and it had earned \$40 in interest for the year (too bad we don't get returns like that today).

In September 1983, Helen Knights had 2 quilters visiting from New Zealand so the Guild members got a treat to see quilting from other places. This year also saw lots of members try crazy quilting and learn the embroidery stitches that went along with it.

In June 1983 the Guild had a display at Benny Birch's Birthday Party in the Mallard Room of the Heritage Building (for those who don't remember, the party was on the grounds where Waldorf and the 2 big condos now sit beside the Heritage). Bea King donated a crib quilt which was raffled for \$68 and proceeds donated to Benny Birch. The AGM was held at Helen Knights' house.

In September 1983 the first beginners quilting workshop was held. In October 1983 the Bicentennial Quilt Contest committee was formed and the Guild decided to make a quilt. The quilt won 2nd place and the \$400 prize. Part of the money was used to buy a protective case so it could be hung at the Community Auditorium. The quilt also travelled to the York Quilters show and the Ontario Agriculture Center.

By 1984 the Guild had 63 members. Ann Bird was an out-of-town quilter who gave a workshop. Jackie Black taught a beginner's course, Pat Angus taught Quilt In A Day. In May of that year the library was started with \$300 and members could borrow 1 book a month. Their June windup meeting was at St. Joseph's Heritage and included wine!

Next month: 1985-1990.
