

Do you have quilt tops just piling up waiting to be quilted? In this class you'll learn how to easily quilt your quilt using your walking foot. Anyone can do this and it doesn't require the practice and hand/foot/speed coordination that free motion quilting does. It is suitable for all skill levels. We start with some simple patterns to start with and work up to some more difficult ones.

I'll show you about 12 different stitch patterns that you can adapt to blocks, borders or an all over quilt pattern. You will need a walking foot attachment for your machine (or some Pfaff's have the even feed system which is fine).

We will <u>not</u> be quilting a quilt in this class. I ask you to bring sample sandwiches to practice on, so no pressure on getting it perfect. You can use up scraps of batting and leftover fabrics for this, but it is best if the top fabric is not too busy or a strong print on the top; use up uglies on the back. I always use muslin or solids. You'll get more info in the supply list.

You can also bring a quilt top for a discussion period about how you could quilt it. Some examples of more advanced patterns you will learn. They are easier than they look. 



Greetings,

Welcome to Fall, my favourite time of year. Perhaps I will finish my fall leaf quilt this year - or just a few squares.

You can bring any comfort quilts, figits or 12 ½ - inch quilted squares to the Teddy Bear collection in November or drop them off at Sew Flippin Creations. Quilts of any size are welcome and will be cherished within the facilities locally. Jackie Black could use a few more squares to finish up bed- sized quilts using the hinge method. Bed-sized and figit quilts were identified as most needed but all are welcomed. Comfort quilt labels are to be sewn onto the donations on either the back or front. Let me know if you need any labels.

Neo Natal	36" x 36"
Crib	34 to 36" x 36"
Wheel Chair	36" x 48"
Nap Quilt	40" x 55 - 60"
Bed	63 to 65" x 80"
Dignity	72" x 84"

Starter materials are also available to make figit quilts and we are hoping to have a Bee early in the new year to share ideas.

Committee members meet about three times each year to sort, photograph and distribute the donated quilts. Please consider joining the Committee and see how much our work is appreciated. Our listing of facilities is continuously being updated. New places can be suggested at anytime by providing contact information and background on their needs. Locations are prioritized by the Committee with focus on benefit for multiple users such as at hospice, treatment facilities or respite homes.

Superior Quilts Quilt Show 2023 Update

Well, the committee is hard at work organizing the quilt show for next May. I hope you're just as busy making quilts! Only 7 months until show time and it will go by fast. It is NOT a judged show so anyone can enter a quilt (up to 3). The attendees get to vote for their favorites. I will be speaking at the meeting this month so if there are any questions about the Quilt Show or who can enter and how then please ask. We also still looking for volunteers for a few of the key show committees – Guild Booth and Registration.

We'll also need lots of volunteers during the show so if you can't be on the organizing committee, never fear, there's still plenty for you to do. Cathy Britt and Linda Boulter will be asking for volunteers for show workers in the new year closer to show time. Here are some updates on a few of the organizing sub-committees.

Vendors: Vicky Butt and Jeannette Dann have been busy contacting potential vendors. At least 10 invites have gone out so far and we have 5 confirmed at time of writing. Oma's, Rhonda's Knitting Room, Sew Flippin Creations, Dori's Sewing and Fix Sew & Scissors. So we look forward to a great merchant mall — we're hoping to get 10 vendors. We'll also have a display from Quilt Canada and the Quilts of Valor.

If any of our Guild members are willing to billet someone from out of town (vendor or a member) would you let us know. It would help defer some of their costs. You can let Cindy Cockell know ccockell@tbaytel.net and I'll pass it on to Vicky and Jeannette.

Social: Luci Andreacchi & Sharon Melville are organizing this. We will be having a banquet and trunk show to celebrate our 40th anniversary. Lots of door prizes. Tentatively we have the Scandia Room booked at the Valhalla. Tickets will go on sale in January. We're still waiting for them to confirm menus for next year.

Quilt Challenge: (Ellen Lang): Well for the first time, all the FQs kits sold out quickly! There are only 6 kits left of Fat Eighths so contact Ellen if you want one of these. So 35 FQ kits were sold.... we hope to see at least 35 entries in the show. There will be some great prizes to be won. Again, it's voted on by the attendees, not a judge. Ellen has the details of the challenge elsewhere in the Quill.

Guild Booth: We still need a few people to help with setting up/taking down the booth but right now I need a person to chair that committee and sit on the show committee. I'm will to help but I don't want to chair it since I'm doing the overall show. I've organized this for the past several shows and can pass on all my info and you can use my grids to setup the booth. This committee collects the items made by members at the May meeting then prices them, then on the Thursday during the show setup, the Guild booth is setup. After the show closes on Sunday the booth is taken down and products left are given back to the makers. This is a great money maker for the Guild and you get some great products are really good prices.

Don't forget to make items for the Guild booth. I know we always get some great things! Some of the good sellers at past shows were fabric boxes, zippered totes, microwave cozies, potholders. Any small gifty kind of item is great. Just don't make those wrap around cup cozies, they don't sell anymore. We will also take quilting books, patterns, magazines in good condition. They were a big seller too.

Registration/Deregistration of the quilts. This happens on Thursday morning – we need about 4 more people to help with the intake of the quilts for the show. Then on Sunday after the show closes, the group gives the quilts back to the owners. The quilts are controlled by a registration label with the makers info on the back so we know who they belong to. So this committee has to ensure the info is correct and attached to the quilt, then make sure the rightful owner picks it up. This applies to any display items people lend us. I have 2 volunteers so far but I'd like someone to also act as the chair of that committee and attend our meetings.

Guest Quilter/Instructor: Laura Cooke is arranging this for this show it will be Geeky Bobbin from Toronto (Bobbie Gentili). She is a modern quilter who does wonderful work and you can check it out at the here the geeky bobbin – fun fabric creations for the little geek in all of us. She'll be teaching 3 courses plus a trunk show at the banquet.



SUPERIOR QUILTS 2023 CHALLENGE

RUBY ANNIVERSARY



In 2021 the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild celebrated our 40th anniversary which is considered our 'ruby' anniversary. For the 2023 Superior Quilt challenge the committee has decided to celebrate this achievement. Guess what colour the fabric is!

Once again Northcott Fabrics has graciously provided 3 bolts of fabric for our challenge. Each bolt has been divided into fat quarters and fat eighths and are now available for purchase.

There is a limited amount of fat quarters and fat eighths available. It will be sold on a first come, first serve basis. Fat quarters can be purchased for \$10 and fat eights for \$5. Payment for the challenge fabric will be cash only. The fabric bundles will be available for purchase at any library night, Vickers Heights sew days and any social that the Guild has. For out of town members please contact Ellen Lang for mailing options.

More details to follow but here are some highlights:

- 1. Create a wall hanging or quilt that can be hung. The quilt must be quilted & bound.
- 2. Maximum dimensions 36" x 36".
- 3. Must use all 3 challenge fabrics provided in the front of the quilt, not including the binding.
- 4. The 3 challenge fabrics must be prominent in the quilt.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to create an original design.
- 6. Only use 3 additional fabrics to create your original design.

Deadline for submission is April 17, 2023.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD HISTORY

Looking Back....a retrospective of the Thunder Bay Quilters' Guild – 1985-1990

The mid 1980's saw the Guild hold several quilt shows/displays. There were lots of workshops & demos offered as members were eager to learn about all things quilting. Both local and out of town instructors gave courses. Some examples were: color and dyeing (Marilyn Walker), stained glass & beginners (Bea King), shadow quilting (Bea King and Betty Cottenden), quilt design (Judith Finkl), quilting shortcuts & using triangles (Jackie Black), Hardanger Embroidery (Caroline Bociurko), EPP, sashiko, silk painting.

<u>1985</u>

Feb – small quilt show in Keskus -I ran across some pictures but then couldn't find them again to include them. One writeup said the display was in the windows of Kresge's so maybe both places.

The Bi-Centennial Quilt was being displayed in more places and appeared in the Sept 1984 issue of Canada Quilts. The main panels are Mt. McKay, Old Fort William and Kakabeka Falls. There were offers to buy it but it was not for sale. It was presented to the City in October 1987. It hung there until renovations were done. Then records show it went to the Thunder Bay Historical Museum. I'm going to see if I can find out what happened to it. This is what it looked like. I'm not sure who made it so if anyone has info, please let me know – 15 quilters were involved.





May – a committee was formed to start a newsletter and in Sept 1985 the first issue of The Quill came out. Those first few years saw only a few issues per year. The first ones appeared to be on a typewriter then later a computer. Joanne Kavanagh became our editor in 1996 and remains so to this day. For those who have never met her, here is a picture from one of the shows in the 80s.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD HISTORY

Sept – Jackie Black did a slide show presentation from the Houston Quilt Show's Radiant Star Fashion Show. Quilted clothing was quite popular then.

Nov – Fanny's Fabrics opened and offered to carry whatever quilting suppliers the members wanted. Lakehead Fabrics was also offering Guild members a discount around this time.

1986 saw the Guild start planning for their first official big quilt show to be held at the NEC (now CLE). Bea King and Elenore Kellenbeck were chosen to hosted it but I don't know if it happened. 5 members attended the quilt conference in Banff and brought back ideas and showed slides of the show. In April the Guild was invited to be part of the first Mayor's Luncheon for the Arts and a few members attended.

June saw a discussion about offering a 2nd morning Guild and in September a group started meeting in the mornings – mainly for older members and young moms. You could be a member of both Guilds. I don't know how long that morning group lasted by I think 86-87 for sure.

Sept – discussion about holding a quilt show at the Art Gallery in Jan 1987. There were 3 judges. A Grandmother's Flower Garden quilt by Bea King was raffled with the proceeds going to the Gallery. 3 classes were offered as well as a slide show and reception. People's choice winners were Janet Rice-Bredin and Mary Cottenden. Janet's quilt, at the right, got over 2,000 votes so the show was obviously well attended. She was the Guild president for 85-86. Janet told everyone how she prices quilts for sale: \$15-\$20 sq ft based on her calculation of materials used, tools purchased and I assume time but no mention of that, so a queen size would be \$1,000 in 1986.

May – another quilt display at the Heritage

<u>1987</u> – another quilt show was being planned for April 1987 to be held at the Airlane. There was some debate about what to charge and they settled on \$1. It was called Quilted



Treasures. The display categories were: Bed quilt, wall hanging, miscellaneous. There was also a display of antique quilts and Christmas Corner. This first big show pretty much broke even (loss of \$17). Winners were: Doreen Everitt (quilt), Stella Leiterman (wall hanging), Doreen Green (piano cover). There was a list of over 100 people wanting to learn how to quilt after the show.

<u>1988</u> – First issue of The Quill appeared in September following by a 2nd issue in December. They made aprons with a hex log cabin top in the purples of the Guild logo. Jackie Black made 30! Bea King gave a talk after her trip to Quilt Canada in Calgary. Jackie Black and Janet Rice-Bredin had quilts chosen for the Canadian Contemporary Quilt Show in St. Catherine's.

<u>1989</u> – 3rd issue of the Quill came out in fall. Jackie Black showed slides from Quilt Canada 89 in Vancouver. Bea King, Kris Perron & Pat Lane proposed that our Guild should put in a proposal to host Quilt Canada in 1992 (we know how that went and more about it next month). In those days Guilds across the country were asked to make door prizes for Quilt Canada and our guild made a lot of hot pads and sent it to Quilt Canada 1990 in Waterloo.

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD HISTORY

<u>1990</u> – start planning for our local quilt show in 1990. They decided to have a merchant mall and Guild booth with members donating items for sale that included quilting supplies. There were 6 demos at this show. Members were also asked to each bake a dozen muffins and donate them to the show café. Guild pins for the original purple logo were ordered. They also started a campaign against the City to fight the Hawkers & Peddlers \$500 license for out of city vendors (they continued to fight this for years as did Artisans Northwest). FYI – even Murillo and Kakabeka was considered out of town. This eventually got partially overturned but not for many years after. Winners of the show: Fernada Oles (quilt – Dresden plate), Muriel Squires (wall hanging – stacked blocks), Stella Leiterman (misc – Nativity scene). In Sept 1990 the Guild's proposal to host Quilt Canada 1992 was accepted and members were invited to design the logo for the show.

Next month: 1991-1992 (Quilt Canada comes to Thunder Bay)
