- 6. The quilts will be pinned to ribbons on the display wall. No need for hanging sleeves.
- 7. Label your quilt on the back only not on the front.

GROCERY BAG PATTERN

This pattern requires 1/2 m of fabric.

Cut a rectangle 15 1/2 inches by Width of Fabric.

Then cut a 3 3/4-inch strip by WOF for handles. Remove selvedges from both strips.

From the large strip cut a 1-inch strip from one of the shorter ends.

To make the handles cut the 3 3/4-inch strip in half at the fold.

Turn the long edges in 1/4 inch on both sides and press. And fold each handle in half and press. Sew along each edge about 1/8 inch from the edge.

Fold the 15 1/2 by WOF in half and press. Turn the top raw edges over ½ inch and press and then fold the edges over another 1 1/4 inches and press to make the top edge of the bag.

Insert the handles under the folded top edge of the bag up to the fold and sew along the top edge 1/4 inch from the fold and then along the folded edge near the fold, catching the handles in each seam. Fold the handles up and sew again along previous two seam lines.

Fold in the short edges of the 1x15 inch strip and sew a seam. The fold the strip in half and press. Unfold and fold each long side into the centre and press and fold again in half. Sew an eighth of an inch in along the open side to make the tie.

With the right sides of the bag facing, sew the left side of the bag using a 1/4 or 1/2 - inch seam. Reinforce at the top and bottom. Then insert the tie in the centre of the right-hand seam with just the centre fold showing on the wrong side. Sew the right seam as you did the left.

At this point box the bottom of the bag about two inches up from the bottom. Turn the bag right side out, fold in three and roll towards the ties and secure.

Thank you on behalf of the organizers. We are looking forward to seeing your quilts and doing this again next year.



Greetings,



Looking Back by Cindy Cockell. This month 2011-2015.

2011 was another quilt show year – our 30th Anniversary already. Quilts were in the Dove Building and the vendors in the Heritage building. This one was special. We decided to honour our oldest member, Helen Knights with a display of some of her works of art. We debated whether to wait until she was 100 but that wasn't until 2012 (and not a show year) so we celebrated 99+. When I first approached Helen and asked her if we could feature some of her quilts and have her do a meet and greet for a few hours one of the days she said OK but someone had to come to her place to get the quilts and then put them back after the show....no problem, her house was a treasure trove of creativity to choose from. She'd quilted for years, travelled the world and was always trying new things in many art forms. For those who remember Helen, you'll know she was full of life even at 99 and she stayed at the show all 3 days, from opening to closing, talking to people; the only time she took a break was when her stepdaughter took her to lunch. The year **2014** saw the official formation of the Placemat Committee. That first year the Guild donated 242 placemats to Meals on Wheels....and we've never stopped, although now we supply a few more places. Lynne Wilson taught an Eye-Spy quilt class. The Guild booth for the 2015 show had a theme of 'kitchen items' so members were encouraged to make things like potholders, jars of cookie mix with a fancy lid. The Twister ruler was just out, and Norma Wynne taught a class using it.

In October many members participated in a Shoe Box Quilt Round Robin that lasted a few months where each participant provided fabric, pattern etc. in a shoe box and it got passed among other members of the group to produce the final quilt top that went back to the shoe box owner. The end of the year saw a challenge going out to members to list their UFOs with the intent on trying to finish as many as possible by June 2015. The first person to complete 10 got a prize but the real prize was finished quilt tops!

2015 was another quilt show year. The show that year only had a single category for voting. The guest instructor and trunk show presenter that year was Johanna Masko. She worked mainly in folk art and primitive styles. One of her classes was the worky houses.

The theme for that year's challenge was Be Happy using the Northcott fabric to the right.

Unfortunately, I don't have any pictures of the 2015 show or the winners.



If you cut a FQ like the chart below the strip on the right should be 2 ½" with a teeny bit trimmed off the sides of the FQ. Since many of our bee projects use these sizes, it works out great and saves the bee committee some work. Note: a FQ should be 22"x18".
