

May 26-28 Superior Quilt Show

Show times: Friday, May 26 noon-9pm, Saturday, May 27 10am-4pm, Sunday, May 28 10am-3pm Banquet: Saturday May 27. Valhalla Inn – Scandia Rooms. Banquet at 6, trunk show around 8.

Well by the time you're reading this it will be less than 2 weeks until the quilt show. And what a show it will be! We have over 150 quilts to see, over 20 challenge quilts, 8 vendors, the café, a full slate of demos, 3 classes and of course our banquet & trunk show. As of writing we had just passed the 100 mark for the number of people coming to the banquet.... Luci and I knew that you were ready to get together in person and celebrate.

Some things to remember:

- Thursday, May 25 from 8am 9:30 am (Cardinal Room entrance on the far right of the Coliseum):
 - Drop off your quilts and props. NO LATE DROP OFFS. Remember to fill out both halves of the hanging tag/claim ticket on each piece and attach the 'hanging' side to your piece (safety pin in a bottom corner). Bring the other half with you and make sure you keep it for pick-up on Sunday. I've attached the form again.
 - Drop off any books, magazines, patterns you are donating to the Guild booth. You cannot drop off any products for the booth on this day it's too late.
- If you have a full-size quilt, please make sure your hanging sleeve can accommodate a 1"x 3" board since the bigger quilts are hung with boards, not dowel.
- Sunday, May 28 doors open for quilt pickup starting approximately 4:30. All quilts/props MUST be picked up by 5:30pm. Once the show closes at 3pm Sunday all doors will be locked, everyone who is not a vendor or part of take down must exit and nobody gets in until Mary-Catharine and her take-down crew give the OK that all quilts are accounted for and ready to go. At that time the doors to the Cardinal Room will open and you can pick up your quilts & props. Ellen will also have the challenge quilts ready for pickup too. Remember you MUST have your claim ticket to get your quilt back that is our security monitoring to ensure all quilts are returned to their proper owner.
- Mary-Catharine & Jeannette Dann could still use some more props. Form attached if you have something.
- Mary-Catharine could also use one more man who is OK climbing ladders to help hang the quilts. Contact her if you know someone who can help.
- Please share details about the show with everyone you know. If you want a pdf version of the poster let Cindy Cockell or Adrienne Lopes know and we'll send it to you. There have been Instagram and Facebook posts created that you can share as well. The more advertising the better!
- Classes (Cardinal Room at the far-right corner of the Coliseum):
 - Vortex Friday, May 26. Noon 3pm (you may stay in the room sewing until 9pm)
 - Moonrise Saturday, May 27. 10am-4pm
 - Y-Seams Sunday, May 28. 10am-2pm
- **Banquet** Valhalla Inn Scandia Rooms. 5:30 pm to approximately 9pm. Symposium at 5:30, dinner at 6:00. Trunk show will start around 8pm so if you have a trunk show only ticket you can show up after 7:30.
 - The awards will be given out at the banquet.
 - I have hit the 40 door prize mark! Thanks to all who donated a prize. We have some great ones.
 - If you wear RED to the banquet, your name will go into a draw for a special prize.
 - Ticket sales are now closed.
 - You will get your ticket at the door at the banquet. Luci has the master list of everyone who requested a ticket and had paid by the due date. Cindy has printed everyone's ticket with their name on it. You can put it in the door prize draw basket if you wish to win a door prize (almost a 1 in 2

chance of winning).

- It's not mandatory but I'd suggest making a label for your quilt and sewing it to the back. Paper claim tickets could rip off and this way we'll know for sure whose quilt it is.
- Bring your own shopping bag(s) to the show. In the past we've saved and used plastic grocery bags but that's not possible anymore. So, it will help to cut down on waste if you bring your own bag. The Guild booth will have a limited number of bags and the vendors will have their own.
- Bring cash for the \$5 admission and Guild booth purchases. The vendors may take credit/debit cards, but the Guild tables do not. There is an ATM on site if you need more money.
 - The café will be cash only as well.
- There is a cash bar at the banquet your ticket only includes tea/coffee/water.

I hope you've enjoyed a trip down memory lane, or just learning more about the history of our Guild if you're a newer member. I've certainly enjoyed researching it and finding out things that I never knew or had forgotten about. It was sad to see how many members have passed on since 1981 but they inspired and mentored many new members along the way and the Guild continues to grow and mentor new quilters. We came from a time when the rotary cutter and special rulers were brand new tools to today's computerized sewing and quilting machines, lots of tools and specialty rulers. We've embraced technology along the way but still hold true to our roots of making wonderful quilts and enjoying the camaraderie of others.

This year we celebrate the Guild's 40^{th} anniversary but the real 40^{th} was in 2021 when Covid derailed our plans. So that gave us 2 more years to plan the celebration, not even knowing at the time if we'd be able to do anything in 2023. So, I'm glad Covid has faded away a bit and we're able to celebrate. Not many groups last 40+ years and are still going strong. So many Guilds folded during Covid. It's a testament to our executive and members who kept it going. Hopefully we'll all be around and get to celebrate 50 years in 2031.

I hope to see everyone at the quilt show May 26-28. Stop by the Hospitality booth in the lobby and look through the hundreds of pictures that I couldn't put in the articles. Find out more about our community charity efforts that maybe you didn't know about. Maureen Mauro will be in the booth most of the show and will be glad to chat with you. Most of all, come out and meet your fellow members in person, at the show and at the banquet and enjoy the celebration...so many of us have never really met each other.

2016 saw the start of making fidget quilts. Little did we know then how popular they would become. They are the most sought-after item of our donations. A challenge was put out to finish UFO's and there would be prizes! Members continued to offer and take quilting classes. And we continued making placemats, teddy bear quilts and comfort quilts.

In December we donated 216 teddy bear quilts at the Christmas Cheer Kickoff lunch. That was a record number to date. They look so good when they're all together!



2017 saw the unveiling of a new, more modern looking logo after members voted for their favorite new design in fall 2016. New name tags kits were created and members encouraged to make one to wear at meetings (kits will be at the quilt show Guild booth).

It was also a quilt show year with Aila Metsa as show chairperson. Sharon Melville was our president. The

Northcott Challenge that year was "Oh Canada" based on their line of fabric by the same name. It was Canada's 150th birthday. The Walleye did an article on the Guild and our challenge. This was the winning challenge quilt made by Jennette Bradshaw.

It was a memorable quilt show but not for all the best reasons. We were hit by a snow/ice storm the day of setup (Thursday). I had my RAV4 loaded with all the merchandise for the Guild booth the day before and my back hatch froze shut and we had to get it out through the one side door that would open. Several people on the setup crew couldn't get cars out of frozen garages and out of town vendors were late getting in. But in the end things worked out and by Saturday the weather improved and we had a great show.

Our guest instructor and banquet speaker was Mary Elizabeth Kinch who taught 2 workshops: The Joy of a Tiny Pieced Sampler and an improv workshop.





Jan 2018 was another great quilt bee with 32 people participating. Lots of quilts got made. I did a demo on making a quilt using striped fabric – several people made these and every one turns out different because of how you cut the striped fabric into triangles and re-piece it. Lots of striped teddy quilts.



Feb 2018 also saw Ellen Lang chair the 2019 Quilt Show committee and plans began for the next show (it would be the last one until this year's). It was moved to the end of May – in part to avoid snow storms.

In Jan-Feb 2018 The Baggage Building Arts Center had a special fiber arts display and many of our members participated in that. It was a great show. We welcomed Julie Plotniko from BC to teach 3 classes: a color blending workshop, a thread painted hedgehog and free motion botanical themed workshop. She's taught a few other workshops since then.

In February Peggy Skillen did a special challenge for making teddy bear quilts: Rip, Snip, Drop & Pass. Each person was supposed to bring a meter of kid themed fabric then we got into groups and ripped and snipped the fabric in half with each pass so in the end you had 4-5 pieces of fabric of various sizes and a challenge from Peggy to make a teddy bear quilt. It was a lot of fun and we got some great teddy quilts.

November 2018 Norma Wynn held a moving sale to reduce her fabric stash and book inventory before she moved to Southern Ontario. Lots of good deals to be had and some nice batiks.... not that any of us needed any more fabric, but we gladly took some off Norma's hands.

Fall 2018 – I became your Program Chair once again and designed 2 more 3-month mystery for the Guild. We also did the ever-popular gadget night and asked members to bring their favorite or not so favorite gadget and tell us about it. We rounded out the fall with an ugly sweater mini quilt challenge, a demo of quick gifts to make for Christmas and a postcard challenge.

2019 – In January 2019 we had a 2-day quilt bee, in part thanks to getting a TBaytel For Good grant which gave us extra money to purchase batting and supplies. In the picture are Mary-Catharine Kennedy, Christina Wakefield, Adrienne Lopes and someone from TBayTel.

2020-2023

Well most of you have been around for the Covid times so no need to go into details. We actually picked up a lot of new out of town members the past few years. Thankfully Cathy Ridley rose to the occasion with the executive and learned to do Zoom and kept our Guild going throughout the pandemic years. Many were hesitant at first but soon found it wasn't so bad over Zoom and at least we could continue to meet. I did a quick pivot and taught classes over Zoom, which was a learning curve and I actually like teaching and taking classes over Zoom for many reasons. Love it or hate it, Zoom did allow us to keep connected and inspired. It also means not having to go out to a meeting in a snow storm!

Many of us started to work from our stash when quilt/fabric shops closed.... but did anyone really make a big dent in it? I designed another spring mystery for the Guild (Tulips runner or wall hanging) and thank goodness I packaged the entire kit at once this time because we couldn't meet the month after I gave them out.

We saw the introduction of virtual sew days, which are still going on today with a good number of people participating every 2 weeks. We made sure to make contact with members to make sure they were doing OK, especially in the early days of total lock down. Most of us have come to embrace the technology that has allowed us to take classes/lectures from all over the world with a front row seat and easy access to our sewing room without having to lug everything. We get a close-up view at show and tell.

It enabled the Program Chair & External Instructor Committee to bring in instructors and lecturers from other countries and even from within our own country. We never could've afforded to have people like Daisy Aschoug from Norway, Mister Domestic (US), Sarah Goer(US), Christina Camelli (US). Even in-country instructors were cheaper – we had Andrea Tsang Jackson (map quilts and gemology quilts), Libs Elliot (Embrace the Chaos), Tamara Kate (tiny squares apple), the Aurifilosphy lecture and many more. It gave us the opportunity to learn lots of new things through seminars like the Global Quilt Connection.

We did the sisterhood swap, a neighborhood house block swap and postcard swaps – some groups finding creative ways to exchange their blocks. Adrienne and Mary-Catharine designed 2 sew-a-longs which saw lots of participation (Ginny's was the back cover of Bayview to advertise the quilt show). Adrienne still had quilt bee kits available and we did the quilt bee but in our own homes over Zoom. But the bad part of that was no dessert table with lots of yummy stuff! We did 2 very successful Christmas Craft Share nights the past 2 Novembers.

The Teddy Bear Committee did have to brave the cold, wind and snow for 2 years and wrap teddies outside. But we did it and made a lot of little kids happy. It was nice to be back inside this year.

We still did the Northcott Challenge, "Reflections" for the 2021 quilt show that never happened. The wall hangings were hung in a special show at the Museum. The show got postponed to 2022 then we decided 2023 seemed like a better option...we were right.

This year we started seeing some return to normalcy and we started in-person sew days and in-person classes again. There have also be a number of socials to get together in person. And we finally get to have a quilt show again. YEA!

We're still in a transition period this year and who knows what the future will bring. But when I see lots of new faces the past few years, I know our Guild is strong and will survive. 2023 is the celebration of 40yrs (plus 2) and here's hoping for many more to come!
